SUBJECT: Investigative Referral NARA-ART-22-0091-I

Enclosed for your review is our **Report of Investigation** (the Report) into allegations that **b(6)**, **b(6)** and **b(6), b(7)(C)** (the **b(6)**), owners of a Civil War memorabilia business, were attempting to sell an original Ambrose P. Hill letter (A.P. Hill letter), which was listed on the NARA Missing Items website. An initial review of information available about the A.P. Hill letter revealed it was among the missing items associated with a large-scale theft of NARA records by Howard Harner, who was convicted in 2005. The letter, described as an Ambrose P. Hill Autographed Letter Signed, 1 page, Culpeper Court House, VA, June 18th, 1849, to Bvt. Genl. Childs at Fort McHenry, was being offered for sale for \$2,500 on the website for **b(6)**, **b(6)**. Additionally, the OIG determined that **b(6), b(7)(C)** was previously in possession of other NARA stolen records.

In summary, the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA), Office of Inspector General (OIG), Office of Investigations (OI), determined that the **b(6)**, **b(6)** were in possession of the A.P. Hill letter. The OIG recovered the A.P. Hill letter and with the cooperation of the **b(6)**, **b(6)** determined that the letter was sold to the **b(6)**, **b(6)** by a private collector/dealer **b(6), b(7)** who claimed to have previously purchased it from another private collector/dealer **b(6), b(7)**. The A.P. Hill letter was previously established to have been stolen by Harner and added to the NARA Missing Items List after his conviction in 2005. The list is publicly available on NARA's website. The OIG did not find evidence that the **b(6)**, **b(6)**, or **b(6)** obtained the letter from Harner or were aware it was stolen NARA property.

In collaboration with the **b(6)**, **b(6)** the OIG and Holdings Protection and Recovery Staff (CH) obtained and reviewed the **b(6)**, **b(6)** extensive records catalog and ledgers and determined that the **b(6)**, **b(6)** previously sold other historically significant documents stolen from or of interest to NARA. Furthermore, some of those records were a part of the Harner thefts and some were included on the Missing Items List. However, the OIG was not able to confirm the **b(6)**, **b(6)** knew those items were stolen and found no direct evidence suggesting it.

The OIG coordinated with CH for a subject matter review of **b(6), b(7)(C)** **b(6)** sales ledgers and catalogs retrieved during the search warrant. Harner's plea

agreement, which included 61 items that Harner confessed to having taken from NARA and remained missing, as well as NARA's Missing Items List, which included an additional 20 items that NARA attributed to being stolen by Harner (but not included in the plea agreement) were used to determine if the b(6), bought and sold any additional NARA records. Furthermore, CH identified four additional records included in NARA's Missing Items List and attributed to Harner, which were sold by the b(6), as follows: 1) Letter-Secretary of War Jefferson Davis to General John Wool, May 30, 1854; 2) Letter-Lieutenant A.P. Hill, 1st Artillery, to Major Winship, May 17, 1849, regarding a leave of absence from Fort McHenry; 3) Letter-Lieutenant William D. Pender, 1st Dragoons, to Major W.W. Mackall, February 2, 1858, regarding a requisition; and 4) Letter from Captain Richard B. Garnett, 6th Infantry Regiment to Captain Dram, March 22, 1861, applies for remission of sentence for Private Hyde. The OIG was unable to identify who these items were sold to, but the OIG will continue to collaborate with CH in their ongoing efforts to aid in the recovery of these missing NARA items.

## BASIS AND SCOPE

This report is the summary of the results of an investigation conducted by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA), Office of Inspector General (OIG), Office of Investigations (OI).

The OIG initiated an investigation based on information received alleging that b(6), b(7) and b(6), b(7)(C) b(6), b(7)(C) owners of a Civil War memorabilia business, were attempting to sell an original Ambrose P. Hill letter (A.P. Hill letter), which was listed on the NARA Missing Items website. An initial review of information available about the A.P. Hill letter revealed it was among the missing items associated with a large-scale theft of NARA records by Howard Harner, who was convicted in 2005. The letter, described as an Ambrose P. Hill Autographed Letter Signed, 1 page, Culpeper Court House, VA, June 18th, 1849, to Bvt. Genl. Childs at Fort McHenry, was being offered for sale for \$2,500 on the website for b(6), b(7)(C). Additionally, the OIG determined that b(6), b(7) was previously in possession of other NARA stolen records. (Exhibit 1)

## ALLEGED VIOLATION(S)

- 18 United States Code § 641, Public money, property or records (Theft)

## FINDINGS

The OIG investigation determined that the b(6), were in possession of the A.P. Hill letter. The OIG recovered the A.P. Hill letter and with the cooperation of the b(6), determined that the letter was sold to the b(6), by a private collector/dealer, b(6), b(7) who claimed to have previously purchased it from another private collector/dealer, b(6), b(7). The A.P. Hill letter was previously established to have been stolen by Harner and added to the NARA Missing Items List after his conviction in 2005. The list is publicly available on NARA's website. The OIG did not find evidence that b(6), b(7)(C), or b(6), obtained the letter from Harner or were aware it was stolen NARA property.

In collaboration with the b(6), the OIG and NARA obtained and reviewed the b(6), extensive records catalog and ledgers and determined that the b(6), previously sold other historically significant documents stolen from or of interest to NARA. Furthermore, some of those records were a part of the Harner thefts and some were included on the Missing Items List. However, the OIG was not able to confirm the b(6), knew those items were stolen and found no direct evidence suggesting it.

The OIG presented the facts of the investigation to the United States Attorney's Office (USAO), b(6), b(7)(C), which declined the matter for criminal prosecution.

**BACKGROUND**

Harner was a NARA researcher from 1996 through 2002, and after stolen NARA records were posted for sale on eBay in 2004, the OIG initiated an investigation and identified Harner as the source of the stolen records. In 2005, the OIG investigation substantiated that Harner stole more than a 100 Civil War-era documents from Archives I in Washington, D.C., and received approximately \$47,314 for the sale of almost half of them. Harner confessed to having stolen more than 100 records from NARA. In 2005, Harner pleaded guilty to one count of 18 U.S.C § 668: Theft of Major Artwork, was convicted, and sentenced to two years' imprisonment to be followed by two years of supervised release. As of October 28, 2005, the OIG and NARA recovered 42 of the documents stolen by Harner. An OIG review of the records that Harner identified as having stolen from NARA included the A.P. Hill letter.

Additionally, an OIG review of other inquiries and investigations associated with NARA records thefts including Harner revealed previous contacts between NARA, OIG, and b(6), concerning NARA stolen records in b(6) possession. However, each of those previous inquiries were handled as recoveries or Replevin actions and no violations of law were substantiated. b(6), b(7) previously cooperated with NARA and the OIG in returning the records, which in at least one instance included a Harner theft record.

In approximately 2006, NARA established the Missing Items List on their public website, which features the A.P. Hill letter as being stolen from NARA's collection.

The OIG reviewed the following relevant records:

- 2005 Harner Plea agreement and inventory of stolen NARA holdings
- Previous OIG relevant investigative reports of records thefts
- Property Records
- b(6), b(7)(C) . website, ledgers, catalogs, invoices, and other purchase history records

**INVESTIGATIVE ACTIVITY**

An OIG review of its Case Management and Tracking System (CMTS) for previous interactions between the OIG and b(6), b(7) revealed b(6), b(7) was previously in possession of other stolen NARA records. Previous OIG investigations determined b(6), purchased records attributed to thefts by Harner and Dennis McTague. However, it did not appear in those investigations that b(6), was under suspicion of theft. Specifically, a review of each relevant contact revealed substantially the following: (Exhibit 2)

*On September 25, 2006, b(6), b(7)(C), private researcher, contacted NARA archivist b(6), b(7)(C), concerning a potentially stolen document he saw for sale on eBay. b(6), advised b(6), to contact OIG immediately. b(6), stated b(6) had a copy of the document for sale on eBay in b(6) personal papers that b(6) made at NARA approximately 30 years ago. On April 4, 2006, [Dennis] McTague pleaded guilty to one count of 18 U.S.C. § 641: theft of government property in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania. On July 12, 2007, McTague was sentenced to 15 months imprisonment b(6), b(7)(C).*
- Letter to b(6), .doc (Related to ROI 06-046-I)  
*OIG letter dated November 1, 2006, addressed to b(6), identifying b(6) as a victim of the McTague thefts, citing, "Recently you purchased historical Civil War material from "hchapel" through eBay/Denning House Antiquarian Books. This material was stolen from the National Archives... This material is stolen property that belongs to the National Archives. Under no circumstances should you sell or transfer this material to another person or entity."*
- Letter of Receipt to b(6), .doc (Related to ROI 06-046-I)  
*OIG letter dated January 8, 2007, to b(6), b(7) confirming NARA received the stolen document referenced in the November 1, 2006 letter.*
- MOI b(6), b(7) -Armistead.doc (Relating to ROI 04-022-GC)  
*On October 12, 2004, OIG contacted b(6), b(7) concerning a signature of General Lewis Armistead he sold to b(6), b(7). b(6), said b(6) purchased the signature from b(6), b(7)(C) in 1998 – 2000 time period, and b(6) sold it to b(6), b(6), stated that b(6), did not always provide a receipt, therefore*

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there was no use looking through b(6) records. b(6), likewise advised b(6) could not research all the purchases b(6) made from b(6), due to the lack of records. b(6), could not recall the specifics just that b(6) bought it from b(6).

The signature was identified as coming from a letter from L. A. Armistead to D. C. Buell, Bvt Maj/Cpt 6th Inf, New San Diego, Cal, dated June 4, 1861, received June 14, requests to be informed if San Diego is a chaplain post. Harner provided the original Letter without signature.

- MOI b(6), b(7) -Pickett.doc (Relating to ROI 04-022-GC)  
On August 24, 2004, OIG called b(6), b(7) concerning a clipped signature he purchased from b(6), b(7) that was stolen from NARA. b(6), sold the signature to b(6), b(7)(C) in March 1999. On June 3, 2004, NARA sent a letter to b(6), requesting the return of "Letter from G. E. Pickett to W. W. Mackall, dated April 5, 1858, requesting leave of absence."
- MOI b(6), b(7) - Hood.doc (Relating to ROI 04-022-GC)  
On September 15, 2004, OIG called b(6), concerning a document b(6) purchased and sold, which was identified as stolen from NARA. b(6), apparently purchased the document from b(6), b(7)(C) between September 2000 and February 2001. Specifically, "Letter from J.B. Hood, 2d Lt. 2d Cav., Fort Reading, Cal, July 4, 1855, asks to be relieved from Lt. Williamsons' expedition to join his company." b(6), confirmed b(6) purchased the following document from b(6), : "Letter from G.E. Pickett dated January 3, 1858, enclosing proceedings of post and company councils 1858P4."
- Inventory of Documents for ROI.DOC (Relating to ROI 04-022-GC)  
General list of documents recovered from Harner and those that remained missing, including one offered for sale by b(6), in November 2021, described as "A.P Hill to General Childs, June 18, 1849, requesting extension of leave of absence."
- Harner CMTS Search.pdf  
14-0025-C: During the interview with b(6), b(7)(C) NARA OIG learned that b(6), appeared to have purchased the Garnett and Pickett letters from Document Dealer b(6), b(7)(C). b(6), was interviewed in 2005, by NARA OIG Special Agent b(6), b(7)(C) concerning documents b(6) sold that were known to have been stolen from NARA by Howard Harner (04-22-GC) b(6), b(7) advised that b(6) bought the documents from b(6), b(7)(C).

In coordination and with authorization from the United States Attorney's Office, b(6), b(7)(C) the OIG used investigative techniques and confirmed that the b(6), business, b(6), b(7)(C) was operated exclusively from their residence and they did not have a storefront. The OIG further confirmed that the b(6), conducted their business online and mailed items to their customers or

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conducted business in-person at trade shows. The OIG also confirmed the A.P. Hill letter was located at their residence in b(6), b(7)(C). (Exhibits 3 & 4)

The OIG executed a search warrant at the b(6), residence and location of b(6), b(7)(C) b(6), b(7)(C) without incident, which resulted in the recovery of the A.P Hill letter (and relevant sales receipt), as well as other sales records related to additional items of NARA interest. An OIG review of the records retrieved revealed that the b(6), claimed they purchased it on March 8, 2015, along with several other records from b(6), b(7)(C), another records dealer they previously worked with. Furthermore, the sales ledger states the b(6), purchased the A.P Hill letter for \$1,150. (Exhibit 5)

In a voluntary interview with the OIG, b(6), revealed b(6), b(7)(C) was experiencing many health problems, which included significant cognitive impairment. b(6), confirmed that b(6) and b(6), b(7) both operate b(6), b(7)(C) and their young adult b(6) b(6), b(7)(C) assists informally with administrative/computer tasks on occasion. b(6), expressed b(6) recalled previously meeting b(6), and b(6), b(7) on approximately 20 occasions and said that b(6) knew how to contact NARA staff in the event b(6) was in possession of a document b(6) suspected was stolen or NARA property. However, b(6), said b(6) was unaware that NARA operated a Missing Items website.

b(6), said that b(6) believed NARA staff were checking b(6) website for stolen NARA materials and claimed the b(6), were not hiding anything, as everything they sell was publicly available on their website. b(6), denied that the b(6), sold anything "under the table" and that everything for sale was listed on the website. b(6), reported that b(6) checks b(6) website each day to see if anyone has made an inquiry about an item and b(6) is the sole person responsible for checking the website. b(6), stated that b(6), was no longer mentally capable of engaging in the business.

b(6), denied knowing the A.P. Hill letter was stolen from NARA and stated that particular transaction was handled by b(6), so b(6) did not have direct knowledge of it. b(6), b(7) reported b(6) publishes items for sale on the website and expressed that the OIG and NARA could search through the business catalogs for items suspected of being stolen from NARA. b(6), denied knowingly purchasing items stolen from NARA. b(6) was fully cooperative with the OIG. (Exhibit 6)

[Agent's Note: b(6), consented to a voluntary interview with the OIG. However, it was noted that b(6), exhibited obvious cognitive limitations during b(6) interview and the OIG terminated b(6) interview.]

In a voluntary interview with the OIG, b(6), b(7) confirmed b(6) and b(6), have owned and operated b(6), b(6), b(7)(C) for over 25 years. b(6), stated they sell historically significant letters from other dealers, eBay, auctions, and Civil War tradeshows b(6), b(7) confirmed b(6) and b(6), store all business-related artifacts in filing cabinets in their home office and in the basement of the dwelling and estimated they had about 25 to 50 "books" of records and records transactions. b(6) expressed the b(6), do not store records anywhere else. b(6), stated b(6) visited Archives I in Washington, D.C. years ago, but that b(6)

never visited Archives II. b(6), denied stealing anything from NARA. b(6), stated the name "Howard Hamer" was not familiar to b(6) and b(6) could not recall specific details about the A.P. Hill letter or previous contacts with NARA about NARA property in b(6) possession. b(6), stated the b(6), keep receipts for all business transactions for a period, but b(6) could not recall how long; b(6) did not believe that they possessed any records or artifacts belonging to NARA, but that the OIG was "free to look" and that b(6) and b(6), "don't hide anything." (Exhibit 7)

In a voluntary interview with the OIG, b(6), confirmed b(6) sold the A.P. Hill letter to the b(6), b(6), expressed that b(6) recalled the A.P. Hill document in question and said b(6) did not know it was stolen from NARA. b(6), could not recall when b(6) purchased it or when b(6) sold it to the b(6), . However, b(6), believed b(6) purchased it from b(6), b(7), a document dealer in b(6), b(7)(C) . (Exhibit 8)

In a voluntary interview with the OIG, b(6), vaguely recalled having an A.P. Hill letter in b(6) possession some time ago but did not know if it was the specific A.P. Hill letter referenced by the OIG. b(6), expressed b(6) may have traded the A.P. Hill letter with b(6), , but b(6) did not have a receipt of that transaction. b(6), explained b(6) "traded" various items with b(6), but could not recall specifics citing b(6) age (83 years old) and b(6) cancer diagnosis for b(6) limited memory. b(6), reported b(6) was not familiar with Hamer and after reviewing the NARA Missing Items list, expressed b(6) did not possess any of those records. (Exhibit 9)

*Additional Suspected NARA Records Identified*

The OIG coordinated with CH for a subject matter review of b(6), b(7)(C) sales ledgers and catalogs retrieved during the search warrant. Hamer's plea agreement, which included 61 items that Hamer confessed to having taken from NARA and remained missing, as well as NARA's Missing Items List, which included an additional 20 items that NARA attributed to being stolen by Hamer (but not included in the plea agreement) were used to determine if the b(6), bought and sold any additional NARA records. Furthermore, CH identified four additional records included in NARA's Missing Items List and attributed to Hamer, which were sold by the b(6), as follows: 1) Letter-Secretary of War Jefferson Davis to General John Wool, May 30, 1854; 2) Letter-Lieutenant A.P. Hill, 1st Artillery, to Major Winship, May 17, 1849, regarding a leave of absence from Fort McHenry; 3) Letter-Lieutenant William D. Pender, 1st Dragoons, to Major W.W. Mackall, February 2, 1858, regarding a requisition; and 4) Letter from Captain Richard B. Garnett, 6th Infantry Regiment to Captain Dram, March 22, 1861, applies for remission of sentence for Private Hyde. The OIG was unable to identify who these items were sold to, but the OIG will continue to collaborate with CH in their ongoing efforts to aid in the recovery of these missing NARA items. (Exhibit 10)

**JUDICIAL ACTION**

On November 16, 2021, the OIG presented the facts of the investigation to the United States Attorney's Office, Criminal Division, b(6), b(7)(C) which authorized this matter for further investigation. (Exhibit 11)

This report is the summary of the results of an investigation conducted by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA), Office of Inspector General (OIG), Office of Investigations (OI).


The OIG received information from the Barack Obama Library (LP-BHO) alleging that between June 2022 and October 2022, they received 13 threatening pieces of correspondence from b(6), mailed to LP-BHO and one threatening voicemail. Specifically, the OIG obtained the communications from b(6), addressed to former U.S. President Barack Obama included vulgar, profane, racist, and threatening language (“die,” death,” “burn in hell”) directed at Obama and his family. As a result, the OIG coordinated with the Federal Protective Service (FPS) to investigate the threatening communications.

FPS confirmed that b(6), resided in b(6), b(7)(C) and completed a voluntary, in-person interview of b(6), at b(6) residence. FPS reported that b(6), expressed b(6) knew why law enforcement was at b(6) residence and immediately admitted to sending numerous letters to and calling LP-BHO. FPS reported b(6), stated b(6) did not believe b(6) letters were threatening and b(6), believed b(6) communications were all free speech protected under the First Amendment. FPS reported that b(6), stated b(6) sent the letters to LP-BHO to “piss off” Obama. b(6), further confirmed that b(6) sent additional letters to U.S. House of Representative Speaker Nancy Pelosi and U.S. Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer’s offices on September 28, 2022, with the same type of language he used in the LP-BHO letters. b(6), reported b(6) had no intention or desire to commit any criminal acts towards the Government or to harm any past or current Government officials.

FPS explained to b(6), that FPS was not infringing on b(6) First Amendment Right to free speech and could not stop b(6) from sending additional letters, so long as b(6), did not use threatening language. FPS reported that b(6), said b(6) would stop sending correspondence to LP-BHO because b(6) did not want FPS or any other law enforcement officers returning to b(6) house and arresting b(6).

On January 20, 2023, FPS notified the OIG that they determined that b(6), was not an active threat, and they completed their investigation. FPS requested that the OIG notify them if NARA receives additional threatening communications from b(6),.
